Q4: As you look ahead to entering architectural practice, what hopes, expectations, or concerns—for your own experience or for architecture itself—would you like the profession to be alert to?

In architectural practice, having a strong voice and promoting change is significant. As an upcoming professional in such a competitive field, directly out of an educational environment, having a fresh voice will hopefully provide positive incentive to a collaborative team. I expect long hours and concentrated work. It will not be easy, but being surrounded by so much charisma and expertise thoroughly appeals to me.

My expectations of architecture are to be a full-fledged licensed architect and have my own firm to manage.

I think one thing that architects need to constantly be aware of is our impact on our communities and how we can help improve them. We have tremendous gifts, talents, and influence, and we need to use all of it to the benefit of others.

I want to have a role to move architecture more into sustainability as of design and using the material. Also I believe architecture is what gets built, if it is just an idea or [does] not get built it stays a design or an idea and not architecture.

I'm open for working under any project type as each type has details that you might not be able to learn somewhere else. Hopefully I'll settle on the long run in a niche aspect. Custom housing is my passion for now. BIM software is a key element for the future of architecture and would definitely love getting on that train before its too late.

I am concerned that architecture firms cultivate an unhealthy work-life balance and do not pay their employees fairly for their time and effort.

I am looking at access and privilege. We need more community spaces created that are accessible and welcoming to all ranges and ages of people. Spaces for workshops, organizing, childcare, and a respite from the bustle of city living.

I hope the evolution of architecture continues to highlight environmentalism through design and sustainable building practices.

I think that architecture should continue to be more than just a building, but more an idea and a story that will impact its users. Newer generations should always be looking towards ways of using technologies to enhance digital fabrication methods, too. And, probably most importantly, the profession NEEDS to focus on sustainable building practices for the sake of our dying Earth.

I don't understand this question.

I hope to work at a firm for the beginning of my career then start my own firm with the knowledge acquired. My concern is finding the right kind of coworkers who are motivated and skilled, but also fun loving and innovative.

I'd like to learn more of architects themselves and provide us students with experiences they've encountered and really just mentor us for what is ahead of us.

I worry that the virtues I have been attempting to develop while in school, such as courage, honesty, and humility, will be diminished once out in the field. I hope to maintain the honesty we are taught here at school, and I hope to not enter the professional world with the intention of just marketing myself for the sake of "making it." Throughout my time in school, we have been challenged to seek what architecture truly is and the virtues and vices attached with this line of work. This discussion should not end once I graduate. I hope to continue the dialogue in every workplace I encounter.

I just hope that starting a family doesn't interfere too much with my career progression.
